Course Description:

Hello! Welcome to Freshman Composition! English 100 is a course focusing on the composition and revision of essays, critical thinking, critical reading, and documentation. The course is recommended for all liberal arts majors and those planning to transfer to a four-year college or university. Furthermore, students may receive up to one additional hour per week in the Writing Center. The class will be in lecture format and is letter grade only.

***All readings will be provided by me, so you will not have to purchase any material for this class.**

English Placement Level of 80 or higher, ENGL A099, C099, G099, G090, ESL A099/G120

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of the course, students should be able to:

1. Evaluate published texts and individual and collaborative writing by applying critical and analytical reading strategies.
2. Support a thesis in an appropriately structured essay, using specific, factual, detailed information.
3. Identify, evaluate, and select research material relevant to a well-defined topic, and properly compile this material into a claim-based research paper using MLA format.

Course Objectives/Online Instruction:

This course is Online which means it will use Canvas online instruction throughout the entire semester. This online course will be completed through the Canvas Modules which will provide sets of lecture notes, reading material, and assignments that you will complete on a weekly basis. I understand that sometimes online instruction can be overwhelming so please do not hesitate to contact me with questions as I am also available to do individual meetings if you would like clarification of anything.

In this class, we will be using reading and writing to explore how language works as a tool of communication as well as how language evolves over time. While we often think of language as singularly a tool different countries use to communicate, it is much more than that. Everything in society has its own language, and we will explore the specific characteristics of the language of our communities, language of speech making, language that manipulates, and language that makes an argument. Your final grade will be based on both the written assignments surrounding this theme and your participation in class, so it is important that you come to each class having something to contribute. This course will be scored out of 100% and the assignments break down as follows:

Classroom Policies:

Essay Format:

Essays and summary/response papers should always be typed and double-spaced with one-inch margins all around. They should also be typed on 8 ½ x 11 white paper. Essay length will vary for each specific paper. For essays, you will have the option of submitting a rough draft if you would like extra feedback.

Plagiarism:

- Write your assignments (whether whole or parts)
- To create summaries
- As a means of information without giving citation
